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THE FRAMEWORK

Every Australian state and territory has its own requirements.

Home education in Australia is regulated state by state. The rules look different in NSW than they do in Victoria or Queensland, but the underlying expectations are similar: register, demonstrate that learning is happening, and renew when required.

THE PIECES EVERY STATE CARES ABOUT

Registration. Lodging your application with your state or territory education authority before you begin.

A learning plan. A documented outline of what your child will learn across the year.

Evidence of learning. Work samples, records, or other proof that learning is happening.

Review or renewal. A periodic check-in with your authority, anywhere from annual to every few years depending on your state.

Every state's requirements are different. The good news is that the work behind each of these can be reused across states if you ever move, and a structured program does most of the heavy lifting.



SHOWING UP

Attendance and engagement expectations.

Homeschooling doesn't mean fewer hours; it means more focussed ones. Most authorities expect a similar volume of learning to a traditional school year, just structured in a way that suits your family.

What counts as engagement. Lessons, hands-on activities, reading, projects, excursions, and real-world learning all qualify.

What it doesn't have to look like. Six hours a day at a desk, or replicating a school timetable.

Record what you do. A simple log of activities and time spent is enough for most states.



KEEPING THE RECEIPTS

Evidence of learning and record-keeping responsibilities.

Evidence isn't about proving you're a good educator. It's about showing your child's learning over time, in a form that satisfies your state's reporting requirements.

Work samples. Completed activities, written work, projects, photos of hands-on tasks.

A learning plan. A documented outline of what you'll cover and how progress will be measured.

Progress records. Quiz results, observations, milestones reached.

You don't need to keep everything. A representative selection across subjects and across the year is what most authorities are looking for.



THE PAPERWORK

Navigating registration and reviews.

Every state has its own application form, timeline, and review cycle. Knowing what your state needs, and when, is half the work.

Apply before you begin. Most states require registration before you withdraw your child from school.

Submit a learning plan. Your application usually includes an outline of your educational approach.

Plan for reviews. Some states review annually, others every two or three years. Renewal is usually straightforward once you've done it once.

A PRACTICAL TIP

Look up your specific state or territory's requirements early. The differences matter.



LESS TO CARRY

How structured programs can simplify documentation and compliance.

A structured program won't lodge your registration for you, but it can make the paperwork side dramatically lighter. The learning plan, the evidence, the records, much of it can come straight from the program itself.

Curriculum alignment built in. A program mapped to the Australian Curriculum gives you most of the learning-plan content already.

Evidence collected as you go. Completed lessons, quiz results, and activity records are saved automatically.
